maintain and develop the sanctuary. The sanctuary currently provides a safe refuge for orphaned and injured wildlife including a number of lions, leopards, cheetahs, wild dogs, caracals, baboons and meerkats as well as many farmyard animals such as sheep, goat, chickens and geese. During your time at our sanctuary you will be part of different activities daily such as feeding the animals, take them on walks, go on game counts, and help with any other projects that may come up at the sanctuary. Activities vary depending on the number of the volunteers and the needs of the animals and project at any given time, so please be prepared to be flexible - be ready to take on any tasks and to get dirty in the process!

Our Carnivore Conservation Research program offers volunteers the opportunity to observe and monitor wild carnivores and other wildlife in their natural habitat, adding invaluable knowledge to research that is used toward sustaining these often-threatened species for future generations. This project is perfect for those with a taste for research, adventure and a desire to see different and beautiful parts of Namibia, as our two sites at Neuras and Kanaan are in the Southern desert ecosystem of the country.

Our Medical Volunteer Program is perfect for anyone with experience or an interest in working in the medical field, whether you're a practicing doctor or medical student we shall provide training depending on your ability. During the project, you will spend most of your time at our remote San Bushman clinic in rural Namibia. Here, you will participate in and assist our Doctor and Nurse with the running of the Lifeline Clinic and help provide primary healthcare to the local community.

## What the Project Fee Covers

All the money raised through our volunteering program goes directly back into the project providing employment, education and accommodation to the local San Bushman community and ensuring the rescue, survival and rehabilitation of the animals which are housed in natural environments around the site. The funds enable N/a'an ku sê to continue running and helps to buy items such as building materials, fuel, volunteer food and animal food and medication.

### Visas

All foreign nationals must be in possession of a passport that is valid for at least six months after the date of entry. The Namibian Government, requires Work Visas for ALL volunteers of ALL nationalities joining the N/a'an ku sê. Please apply for the volunteer work visa before entering the country, allowing at least 2 months for the application process. We will assist you with this process and direct you to our preferred agent for such purposes. Please ensure that you have all the necessary visas for your travel. Make sure you write on the application form we provide the exact number of days that you require in Namibia and check at immigration that they grant you the correct number of days in your passport. If necessary, provide your return or on-going flight ticket as proof when handing in your passport at customs. The address you should provide on the Visa form for where you will be staying during your trip is: **Naankuse Wildlife Sanctuary, Farm Frauenstein 277, Khomas Region, Namibia**. N/a'an ku sê cannot accept responsibility for you being refused entry into Namibia if you do not follow these guidelines.

### Vaccinations

Vaccinations are sometimes required to enter Namibia. For working at the Wildlife Sanctuary, we recommend that you have both **rabies and tetanus vaccinations**. In addition, please also contact your doctor or travel clinic to discuss and arrange the appropriate vaccinations and carry the vaccination certificate with your passport.

None of our southern sites are in a Malaria risk area except for our Lifeline Clinic, which is in a low risk area and **Mangetti Research Site, which is in a high-risk area**. Please contact the bookings manager for further information if participating as a medical volunteer. Please note, you may need to take malaria tablets should you decide to travel to other parts of Namibia during your stay or after the project. Please consult your doctor for further advice.

### Flights

We encourage our Wildlife Volunteers (both conservation and research) to arrive on Mondays and Thursdays in time for our complimentary transfers to the Sanctuary and for the induction on Tuesdays and Fridays. If you are unable to arrive on a Monday or a Thursday, then we recommend you stay at the beautiful Utopia Boutique hotel ([www.utopiaboutique.com](http://www.utopiaboutique.com)), or Chameleon Backpackers ([www.chameleonbackpackers.com](http://www.chameleonbackpackers.com)) where there are a range of rooms available. Transfers which occur to the Sanctuary outside of Monday and Thursday will be charged an additional N\$500 per person. Research transfers occur every Saturday, so Carnivore Conservation Research volunteers will be placed on the Sanctuary prior to departure to the sites, enabling them the opportunity to receive our important induction. Medical volunteers start their project on Sundays with transfers departing to the clinic every second Sunday and are exempt from the off-day transfer fee and may arrive at the Sanctuary on any day prior to their departing transfer to the Clinic.

### Insurance

If you have not already done so, you will need to purchase appropriate travel insurance, including cover for repatriation, for your participation in our project. Please make sure that you are covered for the whole duration of your trip, from the day you leave your country to the day you return. You will not be able to take part in the project without appropriate travel insurance.

### What to Pack

While we do not sell any toiletries, cosmetics, sunscreen or other items apart from snacks and drinks at the Sanctuary, Sunday trips to Windhoek are available but it is advisable to bring enough of what you need for the duration of your stay.

#### Personal Admin

- Passport – including your Namibian work visa, insurance certificates and personal documentation
- N/a'an ku sê emergency contact number (+264 812612709)
- Photocopies of all the above to be left at home with your next of kin
- Spending money – bring Namibian Dollars or SA Rand, you can withdraw cash from the airport on arrival and we have an ATM at the Wildlife Sanctuary
- Proof of inoculations (please speak to your GP about necessary immunizations)
- Secure, waterproof bag for documents and money: sealable plastic bags will do

#### General

The below are recommendations based on our experience

- Toiletries – **Please bring biodegradable products if possible.** As the sanctuary on N/a'an ku sê uses recycled water for our sprinkling system as part of our environmental awareness, we ask that volunteers please bring **biodegradable products** (i.e. shampoo, soap) for use from overseas to prevent our sprinkler system from malfunctioning.
- Sleeping bag (optional): Although we do provide bedding at all our sites, this is useful for winter months at the Sanctuary, possible overnight sleep outs in the field, or if you plan to travel outside of your project
- Silk or Cotton Liner (optional): Ideal for hot nights or as an extra layer to your sleeping bag
- Sunglasses (high UV protection)
- Sunscreen (high factor needed)
- Torch and batteries (preferably a head torch)
- Alarm clock/watch
- Diary and writing pens
- Camera/batteries/film or memory card
- Water bottle at least 75cl
- Day pack/rucksack for everyday use
- Mobile phone set for roaming – local SIM cards are available at the airport or the Sanctuary
- Swimming towel
- Sewing kit and pocket knife for general use (not in hand luggage!)
- [Plug adaptor](#) (3 large round pins)
- Travel Guide, such as Lonely Planet or Rough Guide
- The evenings can be quiet so bring books, cards, iPod etc.

Clothing – if possible, please mark your clothing with your name prior to arrival

All volunteers who come to the N/a'an ku sê Wildlife Sanctuary, our research sites and our Lifeline Clinic will need to wear our **new volunteer uniforms** during working hours. This will become **compulsory for all volunteers from 01 June 2018**.

Uniform consists of the following:

- **N/a'an ku sê t-shirt** (N\$300 for 3 t-shirts, to be purchased here on the farm by the volunteers on arrival. We recommend purchasing 3 t-shirts, so volunteers have one for every day)
- **Trousers or knee length shorts** - Khaki, Olive Green or Denim (to be brought from home)
- **Closed, sturdy footwear**
  - Adequate cover for cool mornings and evenings
  - Sun hat / bandana
  - Gardening gloves to protect your hands
  - Rubber kitchen gloves for preparing food for animals
  - Work clothes that you don't mind getting worn and dirty
  - Casual clothes for day trips to Windhoek and for weekend activities
  - Flip flops / sandals
  - Underwear enough for at least seven days (laundry services are available on premises)
  - Pajamas/nightwear
  - Lightweight fleece or jumper
  - Waterproof jacket
  - **Warm clothes for winter! It gets very cold when the sun goes down.**

### Medical Kit

- Hand sanitizer and wet wipes
- Personal First Aid Kit
- Re-hydration salts and Imodium or similar product
- Any personal medication e.g. prescription drugs/inhalers
- Contact lenses and solution if necessary
- Lip Balm with SPF
- Sanitary products if necessary
- Mosquito repellent (please bring non-DEET mosquito repellent since DEET is not environmentally friendly)
- Ear Plugs – you may be sharing a room with 1 or 2 people and sometimes even an animal

Please bear the following in mind when packing:

- **May to September:** the winter period, it can be **very cold** at night and in the early mornings and daytime temperatures can vary. Bringing your own sleeping bag is a good idea for chilly nights!
- **October to April:** the summer period so can get very hot during the day
- **November-February:** our rainy season, it can get very hot during the day but can rain and become chilly in the evenings, particularly at our Research Sites, ensure you pack a jumper or fleece and waterproof jacket.

## GENERAL INFORMATION

### Arrival & Orientation

You will be met by a N/a'an ku sê representative at Windhoek International Airport or in the town of Windhoek if you stayed there the evening prior. Complimentary transfers are provided on Mondays and Thursdays, with off-day transfers incurring a fee of N\$500.00 per person. The transfer time to the sanctuary is approximately 40 minutes from either the airport or Windhoek town. On arrival at N/a'an ku sê a staff member will show you around the accommodation and facilities. A comprehensive and informative induction session will be held on Tuesdays and Fridays; helping you to settle in, understand more about the project and your role. Activities are continuous, so you will be hands-on from your first day!

Medical volunteers will usually be transferred to the Lifeline Clinic on Sunday mornings of every second Sunday (please refer to the Medical Transfer Schedule you will receive upon inquiring about the Clinic) so if you arrive earlier than this you will spend some time at the sanctuary and will be exempt from the additional fee of an off-transfer day. The Clinic is approximately a 5-hour drive away and you will be transferred by a member of the clinic team. Please be flexible as transfers can depend on patients and other volunteers.

### Departure

At the end of your project you will be transferred back to the airport in time for your departing flight or to carry on your African travels. Please bear in mind that the date of your return flight may not coincide exactly with the official end date of your project. You should therefore ensure that you have enough spare cash to cover any extra accommodation or food costs incurred during the intervening days. Please note that many airlines ask you to re-confirm your flight seats with the airline 72 hours before departure.

### Project Support

Throughout your stay in Namibia you will have the support and guidance of the project leaders, office staff and N/a'an ku sê team. They will provide you with competent field support, assistance and help you with any support you may need during your stay. They will be there for you to contact each day if you have any questions.

In addition, you will also have access to a 24-hour emergency number, so you are always able to contact a member of our team should you need to.

### Accommodation & Meals

*At the Sanctuary:* We have two options of accommodation at the Wildlife Sanctuary; volunteer rooms with up to four people (same gender) sharing each room, or large tents with a living and bedroom area to be shared by up to two or three people (same gender or a couple). The rooms and tents are basic, but our single beds are comfortable with bedding provided (duvets and pillows). Showers and toilet facilities are communal and hot water is supplied by solar energy therefore sometimes restricted. Power sockets for electrical items are available in communal areas.

Three meals are provided on a help yourself basis - Breakfast includes toast and cereal; Lunch includes pasta, wraps, burgers or stir-fry; and Evening Dinners include meat, fish and vegetables with rice, potatoes or pasta. On weekends, we often have a braai (barbecue). Please advise us of any special dietary requirements prior to arrival at the project.

**At the Lifeline Clinic:** Up to 4 volunteers at a time will stay in the volunteer house located next door to the clinic, along with our doctor and nurse. The accommodation is basic but clean with single beds and bedding provided. You will be in a room that sleeps two to three people. There is a kitchen and electricity in the house. Three basic meals are provided a day, breakfast and lunch on a help yourself basis and you will help the doctor and nurse prepare a cooked dinner.

**At Neuras:** You will stay in a large tent with a living and bedroom area to be shared by up to two people (same gender or a couple). Three meals a day will be provided for you, and on occasion you may be asked to assist in preparation of the meals. Drinks (soft and alcoholic) are available along with a small shop containing sweets / chocolate, crisps and cigarettes. Please note there is no mobile phone reception in this area.

**At Kanaan:** Up to 6 participants at a time will be staying in the beautifully renovated Kanaan farm house with shared rooms and bathroom. Depending upon the season, tented accommodations may also become available. The guesthouse has electricity, but volunteers need to bring their own South African socket adapters to charge electric appliances. However, there's no cell phone reception in the area. Most meals will be provided at the house. Beverages, alcoholic drinks and snacks need to be purchased before arriving at Kanaan as they are not available on site.

**At Mangetti:** Situated centrally in the Kavango Cattle Ranch sits the Mangetti village where the researcher(s) and up to 8 volunteers are accommodated in one of the management houses. The house has electricity and running water; the hot water is supplied through a wood-burning water boiler or 'donkey' as it is commonly known.

## Facilities & Services

### Shop & Bar

There is a small shop/bar at the Sanctuary and at our Activity Centre which offers a variety of non-alcoholic and alcoholic beverages, chocolate, crisps, snacks bars and cigarettes. The shop is generally open between 13:00 to 13:30 and again from 17:30 until 19:00 daily and accepts cash only (Namibia Dollars or South African Rand). There is also a N/a'an ku sê clothing and merchandise range available for purchase in the main office. Both credit card and cash are accepted at the farm for clothing, add-ons (such as an evening, lunch or activities at the luxurious charity guest lodge) and excursions (such as Sunday town trips and Safari tours).

### Money

Both Namibian Dollars and South African Rand are accepted in Namibia. You should bring some with you for your trip to cover essentials however we also have an ATM on the farm and we accept credit card payments. You can also exchange money at the Airport upon arrival.

### Internet

Due to the costs incurred, internet is only available on the farm for emergency purposes. If you can go into Windhoek on the optional Sunday trip, you are able to make use of the free Wi-Fi in the shopping mall. There is no Wi-Fi at the sanctuary or Research Sites. **Due to the Isolation of the research sites, there is no cell phone reception.**

### Telephone

We suggest that you take your mobile phone with you - you will need to activate roaming on your phone. It is also a good idea to unlock your phone in case you get the opportunity to buy a local Namibian SIM card (sold at the airport and the Sanctuary) for about £1 (N\$10),

which will allow you to call and text home cheaply and easily. Please note that due to the rural location of the project, the mobile phone signal is quite weak - there are a few spots around camp where you can get reception, but you will need to walk around a bit to find these! Please note in Neuras and Kanaan there is no mobile reception. The international dialing code for Namibia is +264. To place an outgoing, direct dialed international call, dial +44 for the UK, +49 for Germany, followed by the telephone number.

### Water

Dehydration and sunstrokes are always a threat in Namibia due to the high intensity of the sun. We insist that every volunteer drink enough water throughout the day and carry around a water bottle during long outdoor activities. All water from the tap on the farm is drinking water but we also sell bottled water in our shop. Please consider the fact that we live in a desert area and we try to conserve as much water as possible and thus ask for your consideration and cooperation in taking short showers, not leaving the taps running and trying not to waste any water.

### Electricity

There is electricity at all our sites. The plugs used in Namibia are three large round pins (the same as the South African style) and you will need to bring an adaptor to charge electronic items such as phones and camera batteries. Please be sensible when using electricity, as it is much more of a luxury in Africa than it is in your home country. Also, please be prepared as power cuts are common so please be understanding and flexible about charging your items, and bring spare batteries! Electricity outlets are shared in communal areas at our sites.

### Laundry

There is a daily laundry service at the Sanctuary as well as scheduled laundry days included in the cost of the program. If you wish to hand wash certain items, like underwear, please bring hand wash powder with you.

### Weather

Windhoek has a semi-desert climate, with very hot summers and mild winters and temperatures tending to drop heavily at night. On average, Namibia receives about 300 days of sunshine per year.

Summer is from October to April, where temperatures can reach 40° C and plummet at night to below 0 degrees so bring a fleece or extra clothing. Average daily temperatures range from 20 to 34° C. Rainfall usually occurs between November and March, when heavy thunderstorms can be expected.

Winter is from May to September with wonderful warm days which are contrasted by very cold nights, when temperatures often drop to below freezing so please bring warm clothing and a sleeping bag. Average temperatures range from 43°F (6°C) to 70°F (21°C).

The most popular time to travel to Windhoek is between March and October, when rainfall is lowest and temperatures are mild.

All volunteers must operate within the laws of the host country and must not act in a way that is offensive to its inhabitants or to fellow expedition members. Breach of these principles could lead to repatriation at the discretion of the field staff.

We also kindly ask you to wear appropriate clothing. Inappropriate and revealing clothing like mini-skirts, mini-dresses, mini-shorts and belly shirts or cropped tops are not allowed to be worn on the premises. Bikinis and bathing suits are only allowed in the pool area.

At all times the decision of the project manager will be final on matters likely to endanger your safety and well-being and that of the other volunteers. Therefore, you must at all times strictly comply with the laws, customs and regulations of the premises. It is vital to keep in mind that many of the animals on premises are wild animals and thus it is essential to adhere to all protocols regarding animal interaction as these rules are put in place to ensure your safety.

According to local law nobody may carry any unlawful articles or substances whilst travelling to Southern Africa. Should anyone break this law, the Sanctuary will be entitled to immediately exclude the offender from the project and the offender will be responsible for his or her own repatriation and all costs associated therewith. The Sanctuary will under no circumstance assist any such offender in any dealings or negotiations with any authority.

### Cigarettes

N/a'an ku sê sits in a 3200-hectare plot in the middle of the Namibian veldt and it can be very dry here. Irresponsible smoking can have fatal consequences here and is one of the biggest causes of bush fires throughout the region. For this reason, we ask that all smokers respect the designated smoking areas. Smoking is not permitted outside these areas.

### Bar and Alcohol Consumption

We have a 22:00 noise curfew from Monday to Friday and on Sunday. On Saturdays, the noise curfew is from midnight. This means that volunteers need to be quiet after these times. Please remember to only drink alcohol in moderation. Walking between the activity centre and the Lapa after 22:00 (midnight on Saturdays) or being noisy after 22:00 (midnight on Saturdays) will not be tolerated and any volunteer found doing this will be asked to leave the project after the 3<sup>rd</sup> reported incident.

We have had to introduce this strict policy to mitigate complaints from those who respect the rules. This behaviour is disruptive and can be extremely dangerous. There is a high probability of volunteers walking into an area where dangerous animals can harm them if they are drunk.

### Drug Abuse

The possession and/or use of narcotics or other drugs (other than those prescribed by a doctor) is strictly forbidden. This is an absolute rule, and any breach of it will result in immediate repatriation at your own cost.
